Tool Sale Reminder



July Meeting

President Jim Cowan called the July meeting to order and introduced the Guild's outreach chair Candee Van Iderstine. Candee talked about her plans to raise awareness and entice community members to join the Guild, for this she will be doing outreach events in the area. The first is on July 27 at the Busch library in Annapolis. She collected display items at the meeting to show at upcoming events; July 27, September 28-29, and October 10. She passed around sign-up sheets for volunteers to work the events and to teach classes that can be offered as part of outreach.





Bill Carbin talked about an upcoming basic box class that he will conduct with Andy Borland. He made the important point that the basic box class in, in actuality, a basic joinery class that has a box as a by-product. The classes, which can each accommodate five students, will be held in late August and into September. Bill passed around a sign-up sheet – nine signed up. If you missed the sign-up, you can still contact Bill to get into a class.

AWG Raffle Program

Paul Dodson presented an overview of the Guild's raffle system, summarized below.


\$1 Ticket Raffle: Held each month except June. Tickets are \$1.00. This raffle includes the \$50 gift card and 1 or 2 selected items equaling no more than \$50. Total raffle value will not exceed \$100. A donated item may also be included if one is available. All other items are held by raffle chairperson for the next raffle period.

\$5 Ticket Raffle: Held in June. Tickets are \$5.00. Item will be valued between \$100 and \$200.

Christmas Dinner Raffle: Held in December. Item for members will be valued between \$300 and \$500 and a gift card for non-members valued at \$50.

No raffle will be held in August due to tool meet.

Donated items: Donate items must be clean and in good working order.



July Speaker: Shlomi Abukassis

Shlomi Abukassis is a self-taught woodworker who, after twenty nine years of experience, describes himself as addicted to woodworking. He talked about the evolution of his style from basic to sophisticated designs. As an example of his designs he presented an art nouveau staircase that he designed and built in an Annapolis home fifteen years ago. The stairs are





sapele, which he uses frequently, with curly maple inlays and accents. It took him three months to design and four months to build.




The topper to the impressive staircase is that it is reached through a secret door behind a bookcase!

He closed by addressing finish. He used his favored method: he sands to 220 grit, applies two coats of tung oil, then sands to 4000 (dry) and seals with Bison wax.

Show and Tell



Rodger Young brought salad bowls turned from cedar and elm, finished with poly and Osmo.



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Art Mensch has been restoring a church door and in the process he found an interesting joinery artifact. He brought a piece that he had to cut off in which he found oak wedges that had been used to lock in the tenons.



Dennis Harvey demonstrated a task lighting solution that he has discovered. It is a light weight clamp on LED lamp powered via USB, which he couples with a Ryobi tool battery through a USB adapter. This set up is portable and runs for over sixteen hours on a charge. Dennis uses it primarily for show display lighting, but it is also handy for task lighting in the shop

Annapolis Maker Space

Trevor Griffin, vice president of the Annapolis Makerspace, addressed the Guild meeting to describe what the Makerspace is, how they are organized and the capabilities they have. The main points are summarized below. They have approached the Guild about forming some kind of cooperative arrangement. A meeting is being planned to see what can be worked out.

- They've a 501(c)(3) non profit
- They've been around about 7 years now
- Currently they have around 1200 sq ft of workshop but are likely moving to a new spot in the next couple months, a 1600 sq ft shop if things work out
- They have around 90 members and charge \$65 per month for 24/7 access to the shop via key fob access control
- They've been heavily woodworking oriented since opening, which is different than a lot of makerspaces. They currently have a Sawstop table saw with router table attachment, a band saw, drill press, drum sander, jointer, a 20" planer, various hand tools, and a small benchtop lathe. In addition to some of the traditional tools, they have a massive 4ft x 8ft CNC router, a 100W CO2 laser cutter/engraver, a Sailrite industrial sewing machine, a few high end 3D printers, and some other random stuff.

On July 27th the Guilds outreach coordinator, Candee Van Iderstine, arranged Guild participation in a community event at the Busch Library on West Street in Annapolis. Candee reported that it felt like we reached a lot of people and raised awareness of the guild.

The event had about 12 total organizations represented and a surprisingly high total attendance. About 30 people were engaged. More stopped but just to look at the display. In addition to Candee, Carl, Wick, Paul Hansen and Jim Cowan staffed the table.

Many folks expressed that they were interested but did not have a place for a shop. We mentioned

the Annapolis Makerspace to those people as well as the toy workshop as a place to learn and give back. This response may indicate a stronger impetus to some kind of partnering with the Makerspace.

Unlike the big Baltimore wood show in Timonium, these were truly local people. Those who expressed the strongest interest were advised about the tool trade in August but not all. I hope none show up expecting a full meeting.



Appreciation for Guild Members Support of Santa's Workshop

The Guild's toys for kids program requires a significant amount of material – wood, glue, wheels, axels – to keep it operating. The Guild's treasury provides about one third of the total expense, and for the rest we depend on donations from individual members. So far this year members have donated cash totaling \$1500, 1000 wheels and four gallons of Titebond glue. The toy group wants to take this opportunity to thank all those members for their generosity.




Tip of the Month Sandpaper Cutting Board



Here's a quick way to accurately cut to size sandpaper. It can be set up for any sheet size you need.

It's amazing how many different sizes of sanding sheets you need in the shop. To simplify things, I made a jig that eliminates the measuring and can be configured to cut various sizes to fit your sanders and sanding blocks.



A spring-loaded, hinged panel holds the sandpaper flat and acts as a straight edge for cutting. Removable bolts placed in holes positioned on the board create stops to cut each size of sandpaper. You can write notes and labels on the plywood for each size you need to cut.
