# April 2024 President's Message

#### **Dear Guild Members**

One of the joys I get from woodworking is that it often provides me an avenue for learning something new. Learning may come about from simply taking a class or in trying to teach another what I know works for me from past experience. It may also come about as I puzzle my way through a project that is all new to me. These, for me, are reasons why I try to take classes from others when possible, help others when possible, and why I sometimes volunteer for one-off projects posed by others. I realize that for some the latter of these reasons may be a bit scary. It can be hard "putting yourself out there" when trying to teach another or taking on a project proposed by another, but from my experience I can see that each has been most beneficial to me. In each case questions or thoughts of another can cause me to dig deeper into my knowledge base, force me to open up areas I've never thought about before, or solve problems I've never previously encountered. To wit: I've recently taken on a project proposed by a Tuckahoe Park Ranger. Their idea is basically an outdoor jigsaw puzzle with the topic of identifying trees by their leaf shape. Already it



has provided me with an opportunity to learn new CAD skills, new skills with the tools I have, and also identify some significant limitations of the tools I have. This project has already been very rewarding to me in providing a vehicle to think my way through problems, reinforce some skills, and learn some new ones. I've kept the park in the loop and they have been most supportive. I encourage each of you to take on a challenge from time to time. Keep your requester informed and involved in the process and charge ahead into the known and unknown, remembering that if you run into something unsolvable for you there is a forum called Annapolis Woodworkers Guild to ask for possible solutions.



### April Speaker: Gary Rogowski

Gary Rogowski, the Director of The Northwest Woodworking Studio, opened the doors of his shop to offer classes to the public in 1997. As a teacher and builder of fine furniture in Portland since 1974, he has a wealth of information and knowledge to share with others. His goal in opening the Studio was to create a place where people from novice to practiced woodworkers could build work that was well designed and well made. Furniture that had honesty to it and soul.

As Director and teacher, Gary focuses on traditional hand tool techniques but emphasizes contemporary design strategies. This combination offers his students tremendous creative leeway as well as the skills to build these designs.

Gary spent most of his life in Portland having migrated from Chicago to attend Reed College. When Covid in 2020, he closed down his space and moved out to the Columbia River Gorge. All classes are now taught online.



Gary is a frequent contributor to Fine Woodworking and his book, The Complete Illustrated Guide to Joinery was released by Taunton Press in 2002. Gary's latest book, Handmade, Creative Focus in the Age of Distraction, Linden Publishing; is a narrative on creativity, practice on the value of failure and forgiveness in our work. In this time of attention disorder, the book argues that for individuals and for societies to remain creative, we must stay engaged with the physical world as a means of thinking more clearly.

His podcast, Splinters, has echoed this philosophy for several years. In 2024, his new podcast will drop; Creativity: Hustlers, Fakers, and Thieves. It is an exploration of the issues that all artists face from makers and dramatists, to composers and comic book writers. While his focus now is on teaching on-line classes, he does occasionally teach hands-on classes, such as his upcoming activities at Highland Woodworking in Atlanta featuring a lecture on the Rules of Woodworking plus a two day class on making a wooden hand plane.





At the April meeting, Gary will show two videos which focus on machine joinery techniques. One video will cover Sliding Tapered Dovetails and the other will show cut a beautifully simple Finger joint on the band saw. These are great joints which are easy to cut. I use the finger joints for small cases/ cabinets or large frames. For example, see the picture of a small cabinet with band sawn finger joints. The tapered sliding dovetail is easy to put into a case after it's been assembled. This makes it so useful in many situations. A close-up of the dovetail joint and a piece where it was used it are shown below.

Each video will be preceded by a brief introduction and followed by a question & answer session. Gary's presentation will be made via Zoom but will only be available at the meeting; to be clear, members must come to the meeting to see the presentation. Because of the time difference, the usual order of the meeting will switched around with Gary's presentation starting at about 8 pm.






Rick also announced that before the meeting the remainder of the donated wood was sold.




table. He prefers to finish his pieces with either Minwax Poly Ultra Satin or Sutherland Welles wipe-on varnish.

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Bob is pictured at left holding a configurable jig that can be "programmed" to bend table legs in a variety of shapes. Bottom left is a picture of a curly walnut and sapele table that he brought to show.



As Bob discussed his design style he presented an extensive slide show of his work. A few samples are shown below.



#### **Show and Tell**

Rick Hodgdon made this writing table for his daughter using one of the donated walnut boards. It is designed to work with her favorite chair.

Mike Arndt brought a soft brass wire brush, which he advised us to use for stripping old finish. It is very effective at removing the finish from difficult areas, but will not mar the wood as a steel wire brush does. It also avoids the staining that can occur with steel wire.





Marty described the toy project as "a herculean and heroic effort." You can find the three videos at the links below.



# Tip of the Month



The easiest way to start the leveling process is to first make sure the infeed and outfeed table adjustments are loosened and that the tables are well below the level of the bed. Then before adjusting the tables, position the wood and guides as shown above.

### Planer Table Tip

The balancing act of aligning the infeed and outfeed tables with the main bed on my planer has been a challenge for some time. Keeping these surfaces aligned is critical for accurate stock preparation. I came up with a simple solution that will work easily on any planer.

All that's needed is a pair of straightedge guides that are long enough to span your planer's bed, as well as the infeed and outfeed tables. The guides are used to align the tables. It also requires two straight pieces of hardwood that are the length of the planer bed, plus long enough to clamp in the guides. The boards provide a soft spot to rest the cutterhead while making the adjustments.

I started by sliding the boards and guides into the planer opening. I made sure that the board and guide were sitting soundly on the bed of the planer, and there was no debris underneath either of them. Then I clamped a board to each guide as shown in the inset photo.

To start the tuning process, it was just a matter of lowering the cutterhead onto the hardwood boards and locking them in place. With those set, I adjusted the infeed and outfeed tables so they're flush with the straightedge guides as shown in the main photo.
