
November Speaker: Bob Ortiz




Rick also told the group that he had brought some of the donated wood which can be purchased during the break. All the boards that he bought were sold.




Chris McDonald brought pictures and samples of a bench that he made for his wife. The seat of the bench, which matches the dining room table he made, is made of ambrosia maple.



February Speaker: Gary Rogowski

Gary Rogowski, the Director of The Northwest Woodworking Studio and a woodworker. author and podcaster, addressed the meeting remotely from his shop in Portland, Oregon. He presented two of his videos discussing techniques for various kinds of common fixing woodworking mistakes. Some wood damage mistakes included drilling tear out, plywood edge tear out, dings and dents, and black stain (from iron). Construction mistakes discussed were joint gaps, loose tenons and uneven legs.

The Online Mastery Program with Gary Rogowski trains students to design and build handmade furniture in an online class format. Applicants must work to a schedule and on project deadlines while building out of their own shop. All classes, videos, and critiques are given on Zoom. The OMP runs for a two year period starting in October each year. We are currently accepting applications for the start of a new OMP group in 2024.

Students design and build a total of 11 pieces over the two year period as they develop a signature style of their own. Dovetail Tip

Although this tip has been around for quite some time, it worked so well for me that I felt compelled to pass it on.


Faced with cutting through dovetails with small pins (which means large tails), I recalled a suggestion from Bill Schneck to check out a method used by Michael Pekovich. Even after cutting out most of the waste on the pin board with a good quality fret saw, there is still a lot of material to remove. When using a chisel to clean out the waste to accommodate a wide tail, there is a risk of being too aggressive with the chisel and going past the layout line, leading to unsightly gaps which can be hard to fix. And it takes quite a bit of time to do the chisel work.



In a Fine Woodworking article (May/June 2020), Pekovich describes an easy to build work station which allows a router with a straight, bearing-guided bit to easily clean out the waste leaving a flat bottomed space for the tail. (Note that Bob Van Dyke had a video demonstrating a similar technique in 2014.) The work station has a wide top shelf to hold the router steady and clamps to keep the workpiece square to the router. It was quick and easy to make the cuts and just a bit a clean-up left a very nice pin board. The method can be adapted to half-blind dovetails by adding a fence to limit the depth of cut. In addition, this work station can be used for other dovetailing operations and can partially substitute for a bench-mounted woodworking vise.

Toy Workshop Feedback


This thank you note was set to the toy group by a pre-kindergarten teacher at Park Elementary.
