


Candee van Iderstine reported on the July outreach event which attracted a lot of attention and resulted in at least one person coming to the September meeting.

She also passed around sign-up sheets for members to staff booths at outreach events in September (28th and 29th at the home show at the Byzantium Center on Riva Rd.) and October (19th at the craft show in Hyattsville Green Center).

### September Speaker: Don Becker

Don Becker is a lifelong artist who started as a puppet maker and puppeteer. His early work was in sculpting polymer clay puppets until at age forty his father gave him a log and a chain saw and told him to make something. That first attempt (pictured below) set him on a path of working in wood making toys, marionettes, dolls and, most recently, automata.








Above: The stages of action of "Blah to Fabulous Woman" Left: The works of this automaton

Don does all his carving by hand mostly with a straight carving knife. He applies a coat of gesso before painting.



## Show and Tell


Chris Desautels shared his experiments with new finishes that cure with ultraviolet light (uV). The products he tested are from Clean Armor (https://www.cleanarmor.com/wood-coatings), and he found

that they are very easy to use and produce an excellent finish that is wear resistant and chemical proof. While pricey at about \$150 per quart, it goes a long way because it is 100% finish and no solvents. It comes in several varieties including sealers and finishes and it cures under a LED uV lamp in two minutes. You can get a lamp with the appropriate uV wavelength for about \$300.





Duncan Adams made two of these Christmas calendars for his daughters. They were made to replicate one given to his daughters by his grandmother. By making two new ones each of the daughters can have her own. The frame is constructed of poplar and finished with gloss spray paint.



Carl Hoke used the wood from a walnut tree that had been cut down near his garage to make two inlayed federal style card tables. The one pictured will be a wedding present for his grandson.

Bill Schneck talked about the results of experiments with Tite Bond II and small veneer projects. In a discussion with Bob Benke of Tite Bond when he was here as a speaker Bill learned that it is possible to use Tite Bond II as a form of heat activated contact cement. By applying a thin coat of TBII to the veneer and the base, letting them dry they can be bonded by using the heat of a clothes iron on the cotton setting. Bill tried it on several pieces and found that it worked very well on small pieces like box lids.









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# **Exploring Affiliation with Annapolis Maker Space**

On September 19th a delegation of ten Guild board members, including President Jim Cowan, Second Vice President Carl Wick and Treasurer Vince Antonioli, visited the Annapolis Maker Space shop on Hudson Street. There they met with officers of the Maker Space to discuss ways that they and the Guild can combine our resources to the benefit of both organizations. Most of the discussion was in the area of education, particularly with respect to Guild members using the Maker Space to host classes for members of both groups. Future meetings will determine specific plans.

Like AWG, the Maker Space is a 501(c)3 nonprofit with about 90 members, which has been around for seven years. Their new shop has 1600 square feet space. While their members represent a variety of crafts they have heavily woodworking oriented since opening. The highlights of their equipment include a Sawstop with router table attachment, a band saw, drill press, drum sander, jointer, a 20" planer, various hand tools and a small bench top lathe. In addition to the traditional tools, they also have a massive 4ft x 8ft CNC router, and a 100W CO<sub>2</sub> laser cutter/engraver. Some of these tools can be seen in the pictures below.



## Home Owners Show at the Byzantium Center

Candee Van Iderstine organized a Guild outreach activity at the Home Owners Show at the Byzantium Center September 28th and 29th, 2024. ## **Safety First**

As 1<sup>st</sup> VP of the Annapolis Woodworker's Guild, I was informed that part of my responsibilities was to provide safety tips to our guild members on a monthly basis. I will attempt to do this on a regular basis, beginning with the month of October.

So, here goes....

As the weather gets cooler, we will likely wear more layers as we work in our shops. We may grab a flannel shirt or a sweatshirt and go to our workspaces. **Be aware of your surroundings.** Be aware that flannel shirts that are not buttoned, or sweatshirts that are baggy, could get caught on the edge of a workbench, or a piece of wood hanging over the edge of a shelf or table. Worse yet, loose clothing can become snagged by a moving/spinning part of your equipment, whether it's a saw blade, a chuck on a lathe, or a belt on a sander. Accidents happen quickly, and machines are unforgiving. So, as we add layers to protect us from the chill air, remember to protect yourself from your equipment. Snug layers (snug as a bug in a rug) are safer than loose layers.

# Tip of the Month Kreg Base with Bench Dog

This is a sturdy base that's added to your Kreg jig to get you working on pocket joinery faster.

Lately, I've been making a lot of projects using pocket-hole joinery. I don't have the workbench space to dedicate to a permanent setup. But clamping and unclamping the jig on my




workbench was getting old. My answer was a simple portable platform.

Just three pieces of plywood and a dowel are all that's required. The largest piece is the base. It supports the mount that the platform is attached to. A cleat screwed to the base from underneath prevents the whole unit from spinning while in use.

As you see above, a dowel locks it to the workbench.
